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
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The Church as Salt

During the month of September we will focus on one of Jesus' sayings, "You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled underfoot." (Matthew 5:13)

I will be using Rev. Sally Douglas' recent book The Church as Salt as background material so that we can continue to become 'the Community Jesus Speaks About.' Sally's book is not a 'how to' manual for church success. It does not offer strategies or programmes on how we can grow numerically, in fact Sally points out that the desire to big, popular and powerful is much more akin to the way of the world than to the kingdom Jesus speaks about.



Jesus likens the kingdom to small things, salt, yeast, a mustard seed, a pearl and a lost coin. Jesus proclaimed that the kingdom belongs to the poor in spirit, the meek, the nonviolent and those who have the innocence, powerlessness and openness of a child.

Sally contrasts all these things to rise as the church as triumphant from around the year 400 AD. The church became an empire with just as many ambitions as any modern day mogul, amassing wealth, and dominating all spheres of society. Sadly much of this was done through acts of injustice and violence. That all sounds very depressing, so let me lift your spirits a little.

This is the perfect time in church history to "unravel assumptions about church and seek to genuinely engage with the question of what the marks of Christian faithfulness and growth might actually be." (Douglas, 17)

At the end of the month on Sunday September 29th we will have another breakfast service in which we will try to answer Sally's question: What are the marks of Christian faithfulness and growth?

Get your thinking caps on and may the Holy Spirit guide your discernment.
