

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### What is truth?

This Sunday we hear a reading from John's gospel, in which Pilate interrogates Jesus. Pilate is regarded by some as a man of strong moral principles who struggled with his decision to hand Jesus over to the Jewish authorities, others regard him as weak and servile. In the works of ancient Roman historians Pilate is recorded as being "a headstrong strict authoritarian leader who, although both rational and practical, never knew how far he should go in a given case." Pilate eventually caves in to the baying crowd and his name is known to us forever more both in the Gospels and in the Apostles' Creed (in the affirmation that Jesus Christ "suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried").

Pilate is also remembered for asking Jesus an incredibly pertinent question, "What is Truth?" In this century and particularly over the last three decades truth has become more and more a matter of choice. Worldwide people spend hours each day scrolling through Social Media platforms, being fed a diet of 'news' and advertising that appeals to their own political, moral and cultural views. Conspiracy theories that we used to scoff at decades ago as the fantasies of a small group of fanatics and lunatics now seem to attract more and more apparently rational people. What is truth in 2024 and where do we find it?

When Pilate had Jesus standing in front of him, I believe he must have sensed Jesus' authority, integrity and intelligence and he finds himself confronted and confounded by the ultimate truth, found in Jesus Christ, a truth we as Christians testify to. God's revelation of Godself in Jesus is the only truth we can rely upon, it is a stronghold, a sure footing and a rock of refuge. Social Media and its claim of truth needs to be regarded with suspicion and caution. Scientific data, facts and figures appear to be truth but can be corrupted by hidden agendas and propaganda, particularly if big business is involved. Politicians always tell the truth (just kidding), we all know they are well schooled in avoiding honest answers. Even our closest friends and family will avoid speaking the truth if it will come back to bite them.

Jesus is the truth because his way of love, grace and mercy is the only thing that makes sense in this crazy world of ours. We can see the truth, wherever people act towards each other with respect and acceptance. We can see the truth in action when people are slow to judge and quick to forgive. We can recognise love in the qualities of kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control and we know that Love will one day be the order of the day when God's Kingdom is fully and finally unveiled and inaugurated upon Jesus' return. In just over four weeks we will celebrate Jesus first entry into the physical world, but it is good to remember the truth, that in God's good time Jesus will return. That is something worth celebrating every day.
