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Don't count fish, catch people

Isaiah 6:1-8, Luke 5:1-11

Luke 5:1-11 is a fishing story to end all fishing stories. Jesus arrives at the lakeside where two boats have been drawn up on the beach. One belongs to Simon and the other to two brothers, James and John. The three business partners (v7) with their hired hands, had fished all night in the shallows. Jesus is being followed by a crowd and he climbs into his friend's boat and he asks Simon Peter and his crew to row him out from the shore where he sits and addresses the crowd.

The crowd eventually disperses and Jesus persuades Simon Peter to row out to deeper water and let down his nets for some daytime fishing. Only a dumb carpenter would dare order a professional fisherman to drop his shallow water nets into the deep, in broad daylight. You might as well search for a needle in a haystack, but the words of the "master" could not be ignored.

The result was stunning. There were fish everywhere. The nets were in danger of breaking and Peter called for the second boat. Now the nets were full and the boats so overloaded that they nearly sank. There, probably sitting on top of a slimy pile of fish, Simon Peter falls on his knees in repentance with the amazing words of 5:8 "Go away from me Lord, I am a sinful man." The overwhelming awe of the seasoned fisherman brought him to realise the tremendous power of Jesus.

That would be a terrific yarn and little more if it applied only to those Galilean fishermen long ago, but we are hearing it now and we, too, are being called. The story of the gospel reading is that those fishermen did not stand on the beach counting their catch of the day. But (5v11) "they pulled the boats up on the beach, left everything and followed Jesus."

Would you? Would I? Will you? Will I? Have you?

Many in our congregation spend time each week caring for needy people in our neighbourhood and administering our church. Would you?

Our Op Shop volunteers, Our Hands & Feet team. And so many others in so many untold ways cast our lines into the community offering love and support, offering the love of God to others. Would you? Do you?

If Jesus was preaching today he may well remind us that we live in a community where so many are not yet Christians. He calls us to go and "catch them". Would you? Will you?

And what would that mean in practical terms?

Only you can answer that. When the disciples were called, I guess they had no idea what exactly they would be doing in "Fishing for men". But they responded to the call of Jesus. Do you?

Maybe our Lord is calling you today to new and sacrificial service. Some know what it is like to walk away from something they are doing to serve God in another way.

Don't just stand there on the beach counting fish. Leave them on the beach and come catch people for the Kingdom of God.
